What do we know about water that comes from a faucet? Groundwater is the drinking water source for 75 percent of Minnesota's population. It is also a fundamental, but often overlooked, part of the water cycle. Groundwater provides base flow to streams, rivers, and lakes; water supply for irrigation and industrial use; and is a critical resource for animals, plants, and microbes living at or near the surface water-groundwater interface. The goal of this session is to help provide a better understanding of how water moves through the subsurface, both in terms of pathway and rate. Specific topics covered are geologic containers - aquifers and aquitards and how they vary across the State.
